An award-winning professor for both her research and her teaching, Professor Fox Tree studies how people communicate, going beyond the use of conventional words to study gestures, intonation, and collateral signals produced when communicating spontaneously. A fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, she has published widely, and serves as the Principal Investigator for the Spontaneous Communication Laboratory on campus. Dr. Fox Tree is also cofounder of the SPARK society for the development of better representation in cognitive science.
